HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1) **Health Care Law Repeal.** Vote on H.R. 2, the Repealing the Job-Killing Health Care Law Act. Approved 245-189 on Jan. 19, 2011 (Roll No. 14). The NAM supported the legislation, reiterating that the 2010 health care law will drive up manufacturers' health care costs. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 2) **Repealing 1099 Reporting Requirements.** Vote on H.R. 4, the Small Business Paperwork Mandate Elimination Act. Approved 314-112 on March 3, 2011 (Roll No. 162). Signed into law (P.L. 112-9) on April 14, 2011. The NAM supported the legislation, which repealed language in the 2010 health care law requiring businesses to file an IRS 1099 form for every purchase in excess of \$600. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 3) **Retaining Union Election Changes.** Vote on a LaTourette (R-OH) amendment to leave in place ill-advised 2010 National Mediation Board regulations that made major changes to union election procedures under the Railway Labor Act. Rejected 206-220 on April 1, 2011 (Roll No. 217). The NAM opposed the amendment and the 2010 rules, which would reverse decades of labor law precedent without guidance from Congress. **NAM POSITION: No.**
- 4) **Blocking the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Regulations.** Vote on H.R. 910, a bill to prevent the EPA from regulating GHG emissions without the input of Congress. Approved 255-172 on April 7, 2011 (Roll No. 249). The NAM supported the bill, which sought to ensure a healthy and productive debate in Congress before EPA regulates carbon dioxide emissions from stationary sources, including manufacturing facilities. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 5) **Preventing Delays in Oil/Gas Permit Applications.** Vote on H.R. 1229, legislation that requires the federal government to review and respond to offshore energy permit applications within 30 days of receiving such applications, places reasonable limits on the use of courts to block permits and forces the Interior Department to conduct several delayed or canceled offshore lease sales. Approved 263-163 on May 11, 2011 (Roll No. 309). The NAM supported the bill, which aims to prevent unnecessary bureaucratic delays and increase access to domestic energy sources. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 6) **Bolstering Offshore Energy Resources.** Vote on H.R. 1231, legislation requiring the Interior Department to make 50 percent of available unleased acreage on the Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) available for lease and requiring future U.S. offshore leasing plans to include: 1) lease sales in areas containing the greatest known oil/gas reserves; 2) energy production goals; and 3) when requested by a governor, a lease sale that includes that state's offshore area. Approved 243-179 on May 12, 2011 (Roll No. 320). The NAM supported the legislation, as access to competitively priced energy helps U.S. companies compete in the global economy. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 7) **Energy Development off Alaska's Coast.** Vote on H.R. 2021, legislation that would eliminate delays and unnecessary litigation related to attaining Clean Air Act (CAA) permits for companies seeking to develop domestic energy off the coast of Alaska. Approved 253-166 (Roll No. 478) on June 22, 2011. The NAM supported the bill, which would set a clear timetable for EPA permit reviews and resolve other issues related to CAA permits. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 8) **Patent Reform.** Vote on H.R. 1249, the Leahy-Smith America Invents Act. Approved 304-117 on June 23, 2011 (Roll No. 491). Signed into law (P.L. 112-29) on Sept. 16, 2011. The NAM supported the bill, which improves the patent application and approval process and provides more patent protection and certainty for U.S. manufacturers and inventors. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 9) **Preventing Regulatory Overreach on Clean Water Permits.** Vote on H.R. 2018, a bill to prevent the EPA from overriding or delaying states' permitting and water quality decisions. Approved 239-184 on July 13, 2011 (Roll No. 573). The NAM supported the bill, which would give companies the assurance they need to move forward with key infrastructure projects and create thousands of jobs that support them. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 10) **Keystone XL Pipeline.** Vote on H.R. 1938, a bill requiring the Administration to render a decision by Nov. 1, 2011 on a permit for the construction of the Keystone XL pipeline. Approved 279-147 on July 26, 2011 (Roll No. 650). The NAM supported the bill and the pipeline project, which is expected to generate \$20 billion in investment and at least 120,000 American jobs. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 11) **Debt Limit Extension.** Vote on S. 365, the Budget Control Act. Approved 269-161 on Aug. 1, 2011 (Roll No. 690). Signed into law (P.L. 112-25) on Aug. 2, 2011. The NAM supported the bill, which raised the debt limit and avoided a government default on its financial obligations. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 12) **Protecting Jobs from Government (NLRB) Interference.** Vote on H.R. 2587, the Protecting Jobs from Government Interference Act. Approved 238-186 on Sept. 15, 2011 (Roll No. 711). The NAM supported the bill, which would prohibit the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) from ordering employers to close, relocate or transfer employment under any circumstance. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 13) **Measuring Impact of EPA Overregulation.** Vote on H.R. 2401, the Transparency in Regulatory Analysis of Impacts on the Nation (TRAIN) Act. Approved 249-169 on Sept. 23, 2011 (Roll No. 741). The NAM supported the bill, which calls for a cumulative analysis of the economic impact of numerous EPA regulations—Utility MACT, Boiler MACT, coal ash, greenhouse gases, Cross-State Air Pollution Rule (CSAPR), etc.—and imposes a stay on these rules until six months after the study has been completed. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**

- 14) Delaying EPA's Cement MACT Rule.** Vote on H.R. 2681, which would delay implementation of the Cement MACT rule for two years. Approved 262-161 on Oct. 6, 2011 (Roll No. 764). The NAM supported the bill, which would give the EPA more time and better guidelines for developing achievable rules without devastating an industry so critical to manufacturing. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 15) U.S.-Colombia Trade.** Vote on H.R. 3078, the U.S.-Colombia Trade Promotion Agreement Implementation Act. Approved 262-167 on Oct. 12, 2011 (Roll No. 781). Signed into law (P.L. 112-42) on Oct. 21, 2011. The NAM supported the bill and the agreement, which is expected to increase U.S. GDP by nearly \$2.5 billion and U.S. merchandise exports by \$1.1 billion. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 16) U.S.-Panama Trade.** Vote on H.R. 3079, the U.S.-Panama Trade Promotion Agreement Implementation Act. Approved 300-129 on Oct. 12, 2011 (Roll No. 782). Signed into law (P.L. 112-43) on Oct. 21, 2011. The NAM supported the bill and the agreement, which will lower Panama's 8 percent average tariff on U.S. goods to zero and immediately benefit the more than 7,000 U.S. small and medium-sized companies that export to Panama. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 17) U.S.-Korea Trade.** Vote on H.R. 3080, the U.S.-Korea Free Trade Agreement Implementation Act. Approved 278-151 on Oct. 12, 2011 (Roll No. 783). Signed into law (P.L. 112-41) on Oct. 21, 2011. The NAM supported the bill and the agreement, which is expected to trigger an \$8 billion increase in exports of U.S.-manufactured goods and add \$10 billion–\$12 billion to U.S. GDP. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 18) Extending Key Trade Programs.** Vote on H.R. 2832, legislation extending the Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) and Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA) programs. Approved 307-122 on Oct. 12, 2011 (Roll No. 784). Signed into law (P.L. 112-40) on Oct. 21, 2011. The NAM supported the bill, noting that nearly three-quarters of all GSP-eligible imports are used to manufacture goods in the United States, while TAA programs provide key retraining and assistance to trade-impacted workers. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 19) Delaying EPA's Boiler MACT Rule.** Vote on H.R. 2250, the EPA Regulatory Relief Act, which would delay the Boiler MACT regulation for two years and give the EPA more time to re-propose more workable rules. Approved 275-142 on Oct. 13, 2011 (Roll No. 791). The NAM supported the amendment, which would give companies the certainty they need to plan, invest and comply with the rule's capital-intensive requirements. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 20) Revising EPA's Coal Ash Rule.** Vote on H.R. 2273, the Coal Residuals Reuse and Management Act. Approved 267-144 on Oct. 14, 2011 (Roll No. 800). The NAM supported the legislation, which would ensure the safe regulation of coal ash in a cost-effective manner, while preserving thousands of high-paying jobs associated with the coal ash industry. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 21) Repealing Withholding Tax on Government Contractors.** Vote on H.R. 674, legislation that would repeal the 3 percent withholding tax on most government contractors. Approved 422-0 on Nov. 16, 2011 (Roll No. 853). Signed into law (P.L. 112-56) on Nov. 21, 2011. The NAM supported the bill, noting that the withholding requirement would impose additional costs and administrative burdens on manufacturers that do business with the government. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 22) Opposing NLRB Policies on Ambush Elections and Micro-Unions.** Vote on H.R. 3094, the Workforce Democracy and Fairness Act. Approved 235-188 on Nov. 30, 2011 (Roll No. 869). The NAM supported the bill, which would: 1) revise the National Labor Relations Board's (NLRB) "ambush elections" rule so that employers and employees have adequate time to prepare for union elections; and 2) reinstate the standard by which employees vote in union elections, preventing the possibility of several micro-unions at one facility. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 23) Reducing Regulatory Impact on Small Manufacturers.** Vote on H.R. 527, the Regulatory Flexibility Improvement Act. Approved 263-159 on Dec. 1, 2011 (Roll No. 880). The NAM supported the bill, which would put in place new standards that improve the regulatory process and reduce the regulatory burden on small businesses. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 24) Regulatory Accountability.** Vote on H.R. 3010, the Regulatory Accountability Act. Approved 253-167 on Dec. 2, 2011 (Roll No. 888). The NAM supported the bill, which would enhance the regulatory process by: increasing public participation in shaping rules before they are proposed; preventing agency abuses of interim final rules; requiring agencies to use the least costly regulatory option in most circumstances; and providing for appropriate judicial review of agency decisions. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 25) Restricting Oil Shale Development.** Vote on a Polis (D-CO) amendment to strike bill language aimed at increasing the number of oil shale leases in areas where the largest and highest quality deposits of oil shale exist. Rejected 160-205 on Feb. 15, 2012 (Roll No. 59). The NAM opposed the amendment, noting that development of oil shale would provide a safe, domestic source of energy and likely result in the creation of new, high-paying manufacturing jobs. **NAM POSITION: No.**
- 26) Streamlining Environmental Permitting Process.** Vote on a Hastings (R-WA) amendment to streamline the permitting process under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). Approved 250-171 on Feb. 16, 2012 (Roll No. 66). The NAM supported the amendment, which would allow for the expedited development of renewable energy projects and streamline a process typically characterized by delays and cost overruns. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**

- 27) Banning Natural Gas Exports.** Vote on a Markey (D-MA) amendment that would have severely distorted energy markets by banning the export of any natural gas produced pursuant to new leases issued off the coast of Alaska. Amendment failed 168-254 on Feb. 16, 2012 (Roll No. 67). The NAM opposed the amendment, noting that manufacturers strongly oppose needless government interference in their business operations. **NAM POSITION: No.**
- 28) Combatting Foreign Export Subsidies.** Vote on H.R. 4105, legislation that would reverse a 2011 appeals court ruling and allow the Commerce Department to continue levying countervailing duties against non-market economies, chiefly China. Approved 370-39 on March 6, 2012 (Roll No. 96). The NAM supported the legislation, noting that without it, manufacturers would have no means of defending themselves against subsidized exports from non-market economies in the future. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 29) Medical Liability Reform/Repeal of Independent Payment Advisory Board (IPAB).** Vote on H.R. 5, the PATH Act. Approved 223-181 on March 22, 2012 (Roll No. 126). The NAM supported the bill, which would: place reasonable limits on punitive damage awards; allow limits on excessive contingency fees; proportion liability fairly; set a uniform statute of limitations; and repeal the IPAB, whose actions would almost certainly result in higher private-sector health care costs. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 30) Reauthorizing the Export-Import Bank.** Vote on H.R. 2072, legislation authorizing the Bank for three years. Approved 330-93 on May 9, 2012 (Roll No. 224). Signed into law (P.L. 112-122) on May 30, 2012. The NAM supported the bill, noting that the Bank helps level the playing field for U.S. exporters by matching credit support other nations provide, ensuring that U.S. manufacturers can compete based on the price and performance features of their products. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 31) Preventing EPA from Considering Economic Impact of Ozone Rules.** Vote on a Green (D-TX-29) amendment to strike bill language requiring the EPA to consider economic feasibility and costs when revising National Ambient Air Quality Standards for ozone. Rejected 174-244 on June 21, 2012 (Roll No. 395). The NAM opposed the amendment, noting that future changes to ozone rules should include consideration of the potential public health, economic and energy impacts. **NAM POSITION: No.**
- 32) Evaluating Impediments to Energy Production.** Vote on H.R. 4480, the Domestic Energy and Jobs Act. Approved 248-163 on June 21, 2012 (Roll No. 410). The NAM supported the bill, which would: analyze EPA rules affecting the price of gasoline and diesel fuel; pause potentially harmful EPA fuel, refinery and ozone standards until a cumulative impact analysis can be completed; streamline federal permitting rules; and establish an “all-of-the-above” energy program that sets goals for energy production from all sources. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 33) Rare Earth and Critical Minerals Production.** Vote on H.R. 4402, the National Strategic and Critical Minerals Production Act. Approved 256-160 on July 12, 2012 (Roll No. 468). The NAM supported the bill and its efforts to encourage the efficient development of critical minerals, including rare earth elements. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 34) Increasing Access to Offshore Energy.** Vote on H.R. 6082, legislation amending the Administration’s five-year offshore leasing plans and significantly expanding areas in the Outer Continental Shelf available for oil/gas development. Approved 253-170 on July 25, 2012 (Roll No. 511). The NAM supported the bill, noting that its passage could substantially lower manufacturers’ energy costs and grow jobs. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 35) Extending All 2001/03 Tax Relief.** Vote on H.R. 8, legislation that would: extend for one year the 2001/03 tax cuts for all individuals; maintain current estate tax rates/exemptions; and retain current tax rates on investments. Approved 256-171 on Aug. 1, 2012 (Roll No. 545). The NAM supported the bill, noting that extending the tax relief for one year would provide time for Congress to address comprehensive tax reform and, in the meantime, give manufacturers confidence to make investments necessary to create and sustain jobs. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 36) Addressing High-Skilled Workforce Shortages.** Vote on H.R. 6429, the STEM Jobs Act. Considered under procedural rules requiring a two-thirds majority, the bill failed to advance on a vote of 257-158 on Sept. 20, 2012 (Roll No. 590). The NAM supported the bill, which would provide manufacturers increased access to well-educated foreign-born talent in the fields of science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) when U.S. workers are not available. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 37) Opposing Overregulation of U.S. Coal Industry.** Vote on H.R. 3409, the Stop the War on Coal Act. Approved 233-175 on Sept. 21, 2012 (Roll No. 603). The NAM supported the bill, which seeks to limit excessive regulations from the Department of the Interior and the EPA that could decimate the U.S. coal industry, trigger thousands of job losses and diminish a reliable, available and affordable source of domestic energy. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**

SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

- 1) Health Care Law Repeal.** Vote on a McConnell (R-KY) amendment to repeal the 2010 health care law. Rejected 47–51, 13 votes shy of the 60 required under Senate rules, on Feb. 2, 2011 (Roll No. 9). The NAM supported the amendment, reiterating that the 2010 law will drive up manufacturers' health care costs. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 2) Repeal 1099 Reporting Requirements.** Vote on H.R. 4, the Small Business Paperwork Mandate Elimination Act. Approved 87-12 on April 5, 2011 (Roll No. 49). Signed into law (P.L. 112-9) on April 14, 2011. The NAM supported the legislation, which repealed language in the 2010 health care law requiring businesses to file an IRS 1099 form for every purchase in excess of \$600. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 3) Blocking the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Regulations.** Vote on a McConnell (R-KY) amendment to prevent the EPA from regulating GHG emissions without the input of Congress. Rejected 50-50, 10 votes shy of the 60 required under Senate rules, on April 6, 2011 (Roll No. 54). The NAM supported the amendment, which sought to ensure a healthy and productive debate in Congress before EPA regulates carbon dioxide emissions from stationary sources, including manufacturing facilities. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 4) Debt Limit Extension.** Vote on S. 365, the Budget Control Act. Approved 74-26 on Aug. 2, 2011 (Roll No. 123). Signed into law (P.L. 112-25) on Aug. 2, 2011. The NAM supported the bill, which raised the debt limit and avoided a government default on its financial obligations. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 5) Patent Reform.** Vote on H.R. 1249, the Leahy-Smith America Invents Act. Approved 89-9 on Sept. 8, 2011 (Roll No. 129). Signed into law (P.L. 112-29) on Sept. 16, 2011. The NAM supported the bill, which improves the patent application and approval process and provides more patent protection and certainty for U.S. manufacturers and inventors. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 6) Extending Key Trade Programs.** Vote on H.R. 2832, legislation extending the Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) and Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA) programs. Approved 70-27 on Sept. 22, 2011 (Roll No. 150). Signed into law (P.L. 112-40) on Oct. 21, 2011. The NAM supported the bill, noting that nearly three-quarters of all GSP-eligible imports are used to manufacture goods in the United States, while TAA programs provide key retraining and assistance to trade-impacted workers. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 7) U.S.-Korea Trade.** Vote on H.R. 3080, the U.S.-Korea Free Trade Agreement Implementation Act. Approved 83-15 on Oct. 12, 2011 (Roll No. 161). Signed into law (P.L. 112-41) on Oct. 21, 2011. The NAM supported the bill and the agreement, which is expected to trigger an \$8 billion increase in exports of U.S.-manufactured goods and add \$10 billion–\$12 billion to U.S. GDP. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 8) U.S.-Panama Trade.** Vote on H.R. 3079, the U.S.-Panama Trade Promotion Agreement Implementation Act. Approved 77-22 on Oct. 12, 2011 (Roll No. 162). Signed into law (P.L. 112-43) on Oct. 21, 2011. The NAM supported the bill and the agreement, which will lower Panama's 8 percent average tariff on U.S. goods to zero and immediately benefit the more than 7,000 U.S. small and medium-sized companies that export to Panama. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 9) U.S.-Colombia Trade.** Vote on H.R. 3078, the U.S.-Colombia Trade Promotion Agreement Implementation Act. Approved 66-33 on Oct. 12, 2011 (Roll No. 163). Signed into law (P.L. 112-42) on Oct. 21, 2011. The NAM supported the bill and the agreement, which is expected to increase U.S. GDP by nearly \$2.5 billion and U.S. merchandise exports by \$1.1 billion. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 10) Drug Importation.** Vote on a Vitter (R-LA) amendment to permit the importation of prescription drugs into the United States. Rejected 45-55 on Oct. 20, 2011 (Roll No. 172). The NAM opposed the amendment, noting that importing drugs outside the existing safety system established by the Food and Drug Administration could expose consumers to dangerous counterfeit or adulterated medications. **NAM POSITION: No.**
- 11) Disapproving EPA's Cross-State Air Pollution Rule (CSAPR).** Vote on S.J. Res. 27, a joint resolution invoking the Congressional Review Act to void the CSAPR. Rejected 41-56 on Nov. 10, 2011 (Roll No. 201). The NAM supported the resolution, noting that the CSAPR would trigger higher energy prices, compromise grid reliability and lead to more manufacturing job losses. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 12) Repealing Withholding Tax on Government Contractors.** Vote on H.R. 674, legislation that would repeal the 3 percent withholding tax on most government contractors. Approved 95-0 on Nov. 10, 2011 (Roll No. 204). Signed into law (P.L. 112-56) on Nov. 21, 2011. The NAM supported the bill, noting that the withholding requirement would impose additional costs and administrative burdens on manufacturers that do business with the government. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 13) Increasing Access to Offshore Energy.** Vote on a Vitter (R-LA) amendment to increase access to domestic energy supplies on the Outer Continental Shelf. Rejected 43-55, 17 votes shy of the 60 votes required under Senate rules, on March 8, 2012 (Roll No. 28). The NAM supported the amendment, noting that access to competitively priced energy helps manufacturers in the United States compete in the global economy and preserves high-paying U.S. jobs. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 14) Delaying EPA's Boiler MACT Rule.** Vote on a Collins (R-ME) amendment to delay the Boiler MACT regulation for two years and give the EPA more time to re-propose more workable rules. Rejected 52-46, 8 votes shy of the 60 required under Senate rules, on March 8, 2012 (Roll No. 30). The NAM supported the amendment, which would give companies the certainty they need to plan, invest and comply with the rule's capital-intensive requirements. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 15) Ban on Oil Exports.** Vote on a Wyden (D-OR) amendment to ban the export of any crude oil, or petroleum products derived by crude oil, transported by the Keystone XL pipeline. Rejected 33-65 on March 8, 2012 (Roll No. 33). The NAM opposed the amendment, noting that manufacturers oppose needless government interference in their business operations. **NAM POSITION: No.**

- 16) Keystone XL Pipeline.** Vote on a Hoeven (R-ND) amendment to end continued delays and authorize construction of the Keystone XL pipeline. Rejected 56-42, 4 votes shy of the 60 required under Senate rules, on March 8, 2012 (Roll No. 34). The NAM supported the amendment and construction of the pipeline, which is expected to generate \$20 billion in investment and at least 120,000 American jobs. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 17) Taxing Energy Producers/Raising Manufacturers' Energy Costs.** Procedural vote to debate and vote on energy tax bill S. 2204. Rejected 51-47, 9 votes shy of the 60 required under Senate rules on March 29, 2012 (Roll No. 63). The NAM opposed the bill and the procedural motion, noting that imposing more than \$20 billion in taxes on U.S. energy producers will lead to higher energy costs for manufacturers, which use one-third of our nation's energy. **NAM POSITION: No.**
- 18) Disapproving Ambush Elections Rule.** Vote on S.J. Res. 36, legislation invoking the Congressional Review Act to void the National Labor Relations Board's (NLRB) rule relating to union election procedures. Rejected 45-54 on April 24, 2012 (Roll No. 68). The NAM supported the resolution, noting that the NLRB rule would overhaul 75 years of election procedures and place significant burdens on employers while limiting the time workers and employers can discuss pending union elections. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 19) Limiting Assistance to U.S. Exporters.** Vote on a Paul (R-KY) amendment to prohibit the Export-Import Bank from financing projects in countries that hold U.S. debt. Rejected 9-89 on May 15, 2012 (Roll No. 92). The NAM opposed the amendment, noting that it would prevent the Bank from offering key services to companies seeking business in the more than 50 nations that hold U.S. debt. **NAM POSITION: No.**
- 20) Restricting Export Assistance to Energy Producers.** Vote on a Vitter (R-LA) amendment to prevent the Export-Import Bank from financing foreign fossil fuel/renewable energy projects. Rejected 37-61 on May 15, 2012 (Roll No. 94). The NAM opposed the amendment, which would severely harm the export markets of U.S. energy producers. **NAM POSITION: No.**
- 21) Reauthorizing the Export-Import Bank.** Vote on H.R. 2072, legislation authorizing the Export-Import Bank for three years. Approved 78-20 on May 15, 2012 (Roll No. 96). Signed into law (P.L. 112-122) on May 30, 2012. The NAM supported the bill, noting that the Bank levels the playing field for U.S. exporters by matching credit support other nations provide, ensuring that U.S. manufacturers can compete based on the price and performance features of their products. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 22) Exposing Employers to Unlimited Damage Awards.** Procedural vote on S. 3220, the Paycheck Fairness Act. Rejected 52-47, 8 votes shy of the 60 required under Senate rules, on June 5, 2012 (Roll No. 115). The NAM opposed the bill, which would expose employers to unlimited damage awards and encourage more class action litigation against employers. **NAM POSITION: No.**
- 23) Disapproving EPA's Utility MACT Rule.** Vote on S.J. Res. 37, a joint resolution invoking the Congressional Review Act to void the EPA's Utility MACT rule. Rejected 46-53 on June 20, 2012 (Roll No. 139). The NAM supported the legislation, which would help ensure that the EPA writes a sensible rule that curbs mercury emissions without unnecessarily raising energy prices and destroying more jobs. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 24) Limiting Sugar Subsidies.** Vote on a Toomey (R-PA) amendment to reform parts of the U.S. sugar program that inflate the domestic cost of sugar and harm the global competitiveness of U.S. food manufacturers. Rejected 46-53 on June 20, 2012 (Roll No. 151). The NAM supported the amendment, which would alleviate trade restrictions that limit the supply of sugar to domestic users and reduce government-imposed costs on both manufacturers and consumers. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 25) Restricting Companies' First Amendment Rights.** Vote on a procedural motion to proceed to debate S. 3369, the DISCLOSE Act. Rejected 51-44, 9 votes shy of the 60 required under Senate rules, on July 16, 2012 (Roll No. 179). The NAM opposed the procedural motion and the bill, which would hinder political activity and advocacy by corporations and associations and threaten First Amendment rights. **NAM POSITION: No.**
- 26) Extending All 2001/03 Tax Relief.** Vote on a Hatch (R-UT) amendment to extend for one year the 2001/03 tax cuts to all individuals, maintain current estate tax rates/exemptions and retain current rates on investments. Rejected 45-54 on July 25, 2012 (Roll No. 183). The NAM supported the amendment, noting that extending the tax relief for one year would provide time for Congress to address comprehensive tax reform and, in the meantime, give manufacturers confidence to make investments necessary to create and sustain jobs. **NAM POSITION: Yes.**
- 27) Increasing Taxes on Small Manufacturers, Family-Owned Businesses.** Vote on S. 3412, legislation that would result in higher taxes for the vast majority of manufacturers in the United States by restoring high, pre-2001 tax rates on estates (death tax), investment income and couples making more than \$250,000 annually (including S-corps and other pass-through entities). Approved 51-48 on July 25, 2012 (Roll No. 184). The NAM opposed the bill, noting that raising taxes on small manufacturers is counterproductive and will prompt many companies to put investment and hiring decisions on hold. **NAM POSITION: No.**

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The NAM Award for Manufacturing Legislative Excellence

The National Association of Manufacturers (NAM) formally recognizes members of Congress who consistently supported the manufacturing community during the 112th Congress (2011-2012). U.S. senators and representatives maintaining a 70 percent or better voting record on designated Key Manufacturing Votes are winners of the *NAM Award for Manufacturing Legislative Excellence*.

Each vote was selected by executives from small, medium and large manufacturing firms serving on the NAM's Key Vote Advisory Committee (KVAC). Working in close coordination with NAM staff, the KVAC used the following guidelines in selecting votes:

- Votes must be on issues on which the NAM took clear positions and either: a) expressed this position in communications to Congress prior to the vote; or b) communicated its position to Congress with regularity in the recent past.
- Votes must be recorded floor votes. Voice votes, committee/subcommittee votes and conference committee votes will not be considered.

- Votes should be substantive. Procedural votes should be used only in cases where they are a true measure of support or opposition to the bill.
- Votes may be on final passage or on key amendments.

The NAM is non-partisan and does not endorse candidates. The NAM aggressively seeks to influence the terms of public policy debates to reward members of Congress who have supported our agenda and to inform those who have been on the wrong side of the issues that manufacturers and workers in America expect better from our elected officials.

We encourage NAM members to publicly thank winners of the *NAM Award for Manufacturing Legislative Excellence* (recognized in the publication in boldface) for their support of pro-growth, pro-manufacturing policies.
